We use the -ing form:			
a) after verbs that express preference, such as: love, like, dislike, hate, prefer	Most people dislike (work) till late in the evening.		
b) after prepositions	Are you interested in (share) your office?		
c) after certain verbs: admit, avoid, consider, deny, fancy, involve, mention, spend, suggest	He admitted (fire) the employee with no real explanation.		
d) after certain expressions: it's no use, look forward to, can't help, can't stand, have difficulty (in)	I can't stand (sit) next to people smoking.		
e) as a noun	(have) a stable for-life job is a thing of the past.		

2. Fill in the missing parts in the table.

We use the infinitive with to after:			
a) Certain verbs such as: agree, appear, arrange, choose, decide, expect, hope, learn, need, offer, plan, promise, refuse, want, wish	I chose (work) overtime. I needed the money.		
b) Some adjectives: happy, glad, sorry, pleased, anxious, willing, clever, lucky, fortunate	I am glad (help) you.		
c) too + adjective	I'm too young (apply) for any job.		
d) adjective + enough	I'm fit enough (swim) 200 m butterfly.		
e) Expressions: would like, would prefer	I would prefer (do) his job.		
We use the infinitive without to (or bare infinitive) after:			
f) Modal verbs: can, could, may, might, shall, should, will, would, must	I can (speak) for myself.		
g) Make and let	The boss made the employees (work) extra time. Some employers don't let their employees (talk) while they're working.		
h) Expressions like: would rather	I'd rather (go) to the cinema than staying home watching TV.
